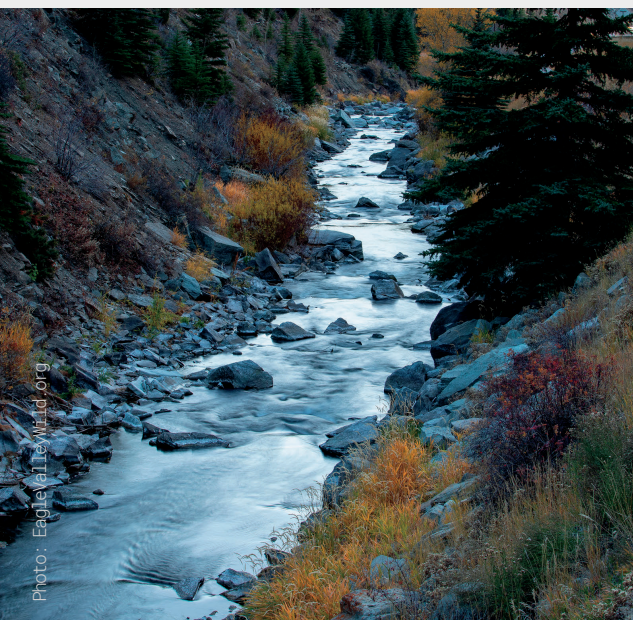
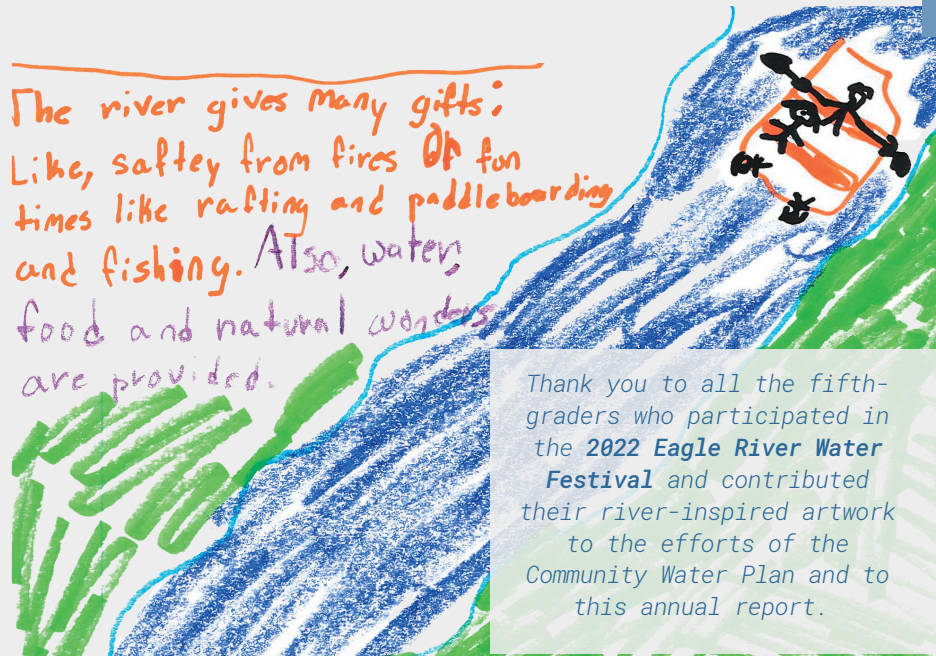

# RESTORE



## Brush Creek Restoration (Phase 1)

**Location:** Brush Creek, Eagle

Eagle River Watershed Council and Eagle County Open Space **enhanced riparian habitat** by installing low-tech structures in the creek. The goal of the project is to **restore stream complexity** and prevent future degradation.



## Wearyman Watershed Improvements

**Location:** Near Red Cliff, CO

The Watershed Council collaborated with the Forest Service and National Forest Foundation to **address water quality and access concerns** regarding Wearyman Road. Work involved improving drainage features, armoring road-stream crossings, and clearing slide debris. This is an ongoing project that will continue as we seek a permanent solution, but the effort **reopened the area**, allowing recreation access in the meantime.



## Tamarisk Mitigation

**Location:** Dotsero Confluence

**Total Project Cost:** \$46,693

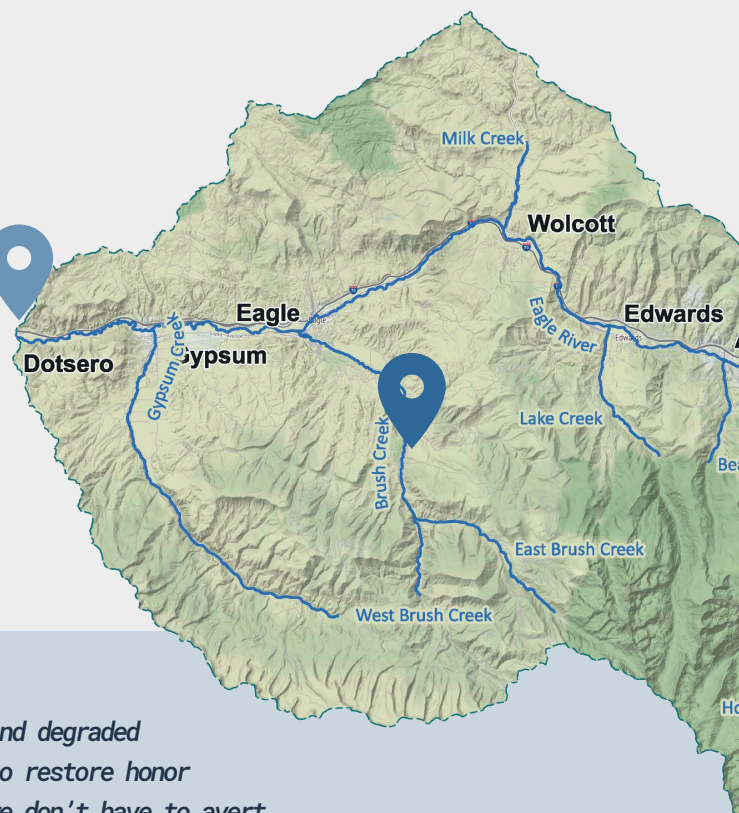
31 Participants **treated 2.5 acres of tamarisk infestation**. Tamarisk is an invasive species that chokes out **native vegetation**, consumes a large amount of water, and contributes to wildfire risk.



## Restore the Gore Plantings

**Location:** Banks of Gore Creek, Vail  
**Approximate Total Project Cost:** \$18,000  
**Volunteers:** 37 over 3 days of projects

Gore Creek has been labeled an impaired waterway since 2012. Together with the Town of Vail, **volunteers installed plants** to help stabilize banks, offer shade, and filter pollutants. They also removed invasive species and planted **native vegetation**.

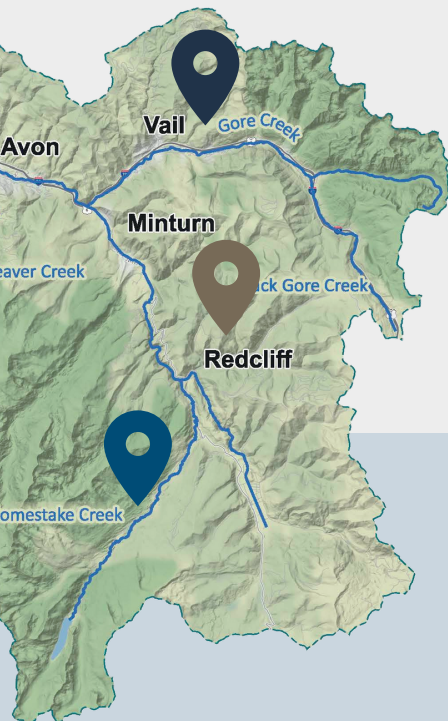
## Annual Eagle River Water Festival

**Location:** Kids from across Eagle County

Eagle River Watershed Council partnered with presenters from local organizations and agencies to provide **educational experiences** for 420 local fifth-grade students. Topics ranged from macroinvertebrate identification and fly fishing basics to games teaching water safety principles and allocations.

## 2022 Impact by the Numbers

**869 people** participated in 2022 education programming to connect with, learn about and explore our watershed.

# INSPIRE



## Homestake Community Science Day

**Location:** Homestake Valley

Participants used the iNaturalist app to **identify and mark 90 species** in a rare fen, an ecosystem in the Homestake Valley. The event was a **collaborative effort** with Wilderness Workshop, Walking Mountains Science Center, the Colorado Natural Heritage Program, and individual presenters.

## Annual Community Float

**Location:** Colorado River

Brought Eagle Valley Outdoor Movement participant families and bilingual guides together for a **fun and educational day on the water**. Most of the 62 participants had never been on a raft, and felt welcome because of how the event helps to **overcome barriers to access**, including experience and cost.





# OUR MISSION AT WORK

Eagle River Watershed Council advocates for the health of the Upper Colorado and Eagle River watersheds through research, education and projects.

## MONITOR

Coordinated by the Watershed Council, the 2022 Water Quality Monitoring and Assessment Program's Water Quality Report Card collated and analyzed **36,073 data observations** of **200 different monitoring parameters** collected at **75 sites** throughout the watershed by **7 partner organizations**.

## COLLABORATE

We review, comment on and participate in local master and comprehensive plan development. In 2023, we will publish the Community Water Plan, the result of a 6-year+ stakeholder-guided process to **identify core values around local waterways** and protect them against current and anticipated threats.

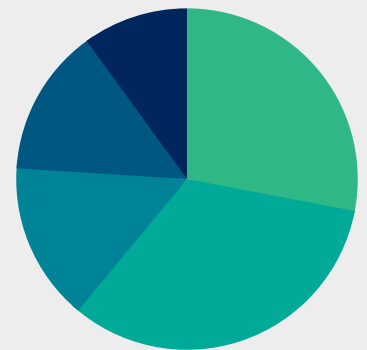
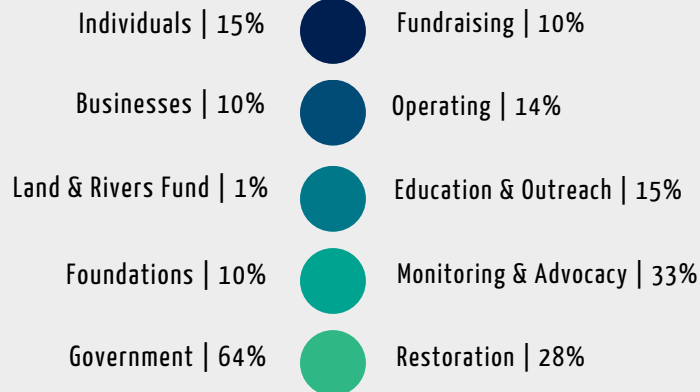
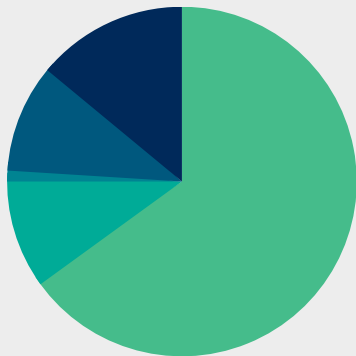
## ADVOCATE
